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Chair's Message

In 1982, the Program in Planning was merged with the Department of Geography at UofT. The merger was a logical one given the long tradition and history of both academic units (geography was established in 1935 and urban and regional planning in 1963). This tradition included the study of the political economy of urban and regional environments, predictions and planning for future development of urban landscapes, and a strong interest in understanding how to achieve sustainability given the rapid growth in population. While the graduate planning program has maintained its core as a distinct professional training venue, planning and geography have become closely aligned over the years. Each has benefited greatly from the richness in scholarship, teaching and backgrounds of our faculty and students and our connections to the “real” issues of the day in the Greater Toronto Area (GTA) and other urban regions around the world. Alumni and friends of the Department have been integral to the development of our programs and student training. I have been impressed with the diversity of these interactions at professional meetings and workshops, city and regional advisory councils, joint research projects and in government policy and development debates. This has stimulated critical thinking and allowed students – through research projects, internships and post-graduate employment – to train and learn with some of the very best leaders.

A perfect example of this is John Bousfield. John is an alumnus of our undergraduate geography program (5T1), a graduate of the University of Wisconsin’s City and Regional Planning program and a wonderfully accomplished professional planner who is recognized nationally and internationally for his achievements. For the past 50 years John Bousfield has been at the forefront of much of the GTA’s most successful and groundbreaking planning initiatives. These range from the 1967 Metro Waterfront Plan to his work on the Erin Mills community plan in the 1970s to his current involvement planning new adult lifestyle and retirement communities. He has earned a reputation for excellence among private and public sector clients, as well as municipal and provincial officials for his professionalism, and for his passion to make communities better places to live and work.

This past November we celebrated the formal establishment of the John Bousfield-Connaught Distinguished Visitor in Planning – a program to attract leading planners, academics and other professionals from around the world to our Department, the university and the community to help stimulate discussions on critical issues of the day. The Bousfield visitorship was made possible by a lead gift from Mitchell Goldhar as well as support from Bousfields Inc., Geranium Corporation, Glen Corporation, Graywood Development, Metrus Development Inc., the Picov Family, TACC Construction and The MetroOntario Group. This gift will be double matched by UofT and by the University’s Connaught Fund, to create a \$1.5 million endowment.

We are excited about the possibilities this visitorship will bring to our community of professionals, scholars and students in the coming months and years. Having had the opportunity to meet and learn more about John and his family over the last few years, I appreciate even more his contributions as an alumnus, professional planner and friend of the discipline.

Joanna is a town planner who has worked in the UK on a number of major projects and initiatives within the public and private sector. She is Deputy Chief Executive of CABA (Commission for Architecture and the Built Environment) a government funded agency that promotes design quality across England. Joanna is currently on secondment from CABA to the Olympic Delivery Authority where she is the Director of Design.

Since 2000, Joanna has been at the centre of setting up and growing CABA. England is in the midst of a major public sector building program. At CABA, Joanna directs the advisory services that provide technical advice and support to client organizations who are devising regeneration and masterplanning projects. In particular, she has led the work on major masterplans, housing renewal and design coding while advising the design and procurement of housing, health centres, and schools.

Joanna's new challenge is preparing London to welcome the world for the 2012 Olympics. The Olympic Delivery Authority is the agency set up to deliver the physical development of the Olympic Park and venues for the London 2012 Olympics. As Director of Design for the ODA she is overseeing the masterplan and design of the Park and brief development and procurement of the venues.

As a town planner Joanna has been involved in a broad spectrum of design, planning and regeneration best practice. Prior to working at CABA she worked in consultancy, on masterplanning projects and planning policy development, including the masterplanning of Manchester City Centre, during the rebuilding programme following the IRA bombing of 1996.

Certain recent events in some natural and human systems have suddenly catapulted 'thinking about thinking' into the harsh immediacy of the reality of our human condition.

The hurricanes that hit the north shores of the Gulf of Mexico were natural happenings in the biosphere. By ill luck, they vented their fury on an area of human population vital for energy production and refining.

The human systems failed, at least in part. All three levels of government, the special emergency arrangements (FEMA), and the voluntary helping services were all slow to act. When they did get going, their efforts were inadequate for the magnitude of the emergency.

Do such experiences of events that show failure in human systems suggest a common cause? May we expect more of the same, perhaps more frequently and of a greater magnitude?

Some responses to such questions may already be appearing. The Toronto Globe and Mail recently had an article on the need for critical thinking. But what does that mean? Does it mean thinking within the boundaries of the very thinking that led to present system failures? Are we now thinking merely about making more efficient and productive systems that have already reached their maximum capability?

Full definitive answers to such questions cannot yet be given. How and why cultures and their societies rise, remain stable and then decline, is not completely understood. We do not even know if it is useful to ask such questions for operating in the actual world. But if cultural and socio-economic change are found useful from examining the way we have come out of our recent pasts, then at least we have to make the effort to minimize the human suffering. Change will threaten to impact particularly large urban populations which cannot drop to subsistence living on the land, as in some cultures.

If urban planners do not become proficient at understanding systems and the way they interact, it seems likely they will remain locked in thinking modes that are already obsolete.

Historic Photo of Griffith Taylor

Marie Sanderson



Readers of GEOPLAN know that Griffith Taylor was the founder of UofT's Geography Department in 1935, the first Department of Geography at a Canadian university. Many readers will also know that Taylor was the senior geologist on the famous Scott Antarctic Expedition in 1910-1912. In November 1911, as instructed by Captain Scott, Taylor led a three month geological exploration of the coast of Victoria Land. The amount of work that Grif and his colleagues accomplished was phenomenal. The surveys were remarkable in view of the fact that they were done with plane-table and theodolite under extremely difficult weather conditions. Taylor also developed a theory explaining the build of the Antarctic Continent. He described his Antarctic experiences in a book called "*With Scott, the Silver Lining*" (a copy of the book is on display in the Geography Department at U of T).

The historic photo above shows Taylor in his sledging gear at the start of the Western Party in November 1911. It was taken by Herbert Ponting, the official photographer of the Scott Expedition. A 18" x 13" original of this photo was featured at the Steven Bulger Gallery in Toronto. Several UTAGA members viewed the photo and enthusiastically suggested that the true home for the photo was in the Department of Geography at UofT. The department is supporting acquisition of this historic original photograph, which is now almost 100 years old, and plans to display it in Sidney Smith Hall.

Departmental News

New Appointments



Dr. Ron Buliung joined the UTM Department of Geography and the graduate department on January 1, 2006. Ron completed an NSERC-funded post-doctoral fellowship with the Joint Program in Transportation in the Faculty of Engineering at the University of Toronto last fall. This was preceded by graduate and undergraduate studies in

Geography at McMaster University (Ph.D. 2004; MA, 1997; BA, 1993). Ron's research attempts to broaden current thinking regarding the influence of transport and land use policy on the spatial behaviour of urban agents (households, firms, etc). To this end, he has been exploring the relationship between daily activities and travel, and the morphology of urban areas. He has also been working on the development and application of measures for describing human behaviour within the space-time domain. Recent research activities include examining the travel impacts of 'big-box' retail in the Greater Toronto Area, and the development of open source tools for measuring spatial properties of activity-travel behaviour. Ron will be teaching undergraduate courses in geographic information systems, quantitative methods and the geography of transportation. A graduate course on transportation planning is in development.



Dr. Sarah Finkelstein joined the St. George Department of Geography and the graduate department on January 1, 2006. Sarah completed an NSERC-funded post-doctoral fellowship at the Laboratory for Paleoclimatology and Climatology in the Department of Geography at the University of

Ottawa. Sarah did her Ph.D. in Geography at UofT (2004), preceded by graduate studies in plant sciences at Cambridge (M.Phil, 1999) and undergraduate studies in ecology and environmental studies at Princeton (BA 1998). Sarah's research is directed towards improved understanding of paleoenvironmental changes from recent to Holocene time scales reconstructed from a wide variety of paleoecological indicators including pollen and diatoms. She is interested in the relationship between climate variability, water level changes and plant community responses in wetlands, peatlands and near lakes. After several years studying temperate marsh and wetland environments of southern Ontario (including human impacts), Sarah is starting a research program in the Canadian Arctic. She will be teaching biogeography, field methods, introduction to physical geography. She is also developing a graduate course in the area of paleoenvironmental reconstruction.

We welcome Dr. Nathan Basiliko to the Department of Geography at UTM. This has very successfully concluded our search for a physical geographer with a specialization in soil processes. Nathan brings to UofT an exceptionally rich research program in the biogeochemistry and microbial ecology of northern forest and wetland ecosystems, global and environmental change, natural resource management and ecosystem restoration. His work complements not only the tri-campus research interests of the Department of Geography, but also will make important contributions to a wide range of new collaborations. The Department of Geography at UTM is particularly excited about Nathan's role in an emerging Landscape Genetics research cluster that brings together faculty in Geography and Biology at UTM. Nathan will officially join the Department in July 2006.

Congratulations to Professor Don Boyes who has been promoted to Senior Lecturer. Don joined the Department on July 1, 2001 and quickly established himself as a valued member of the Department and the University. Thanks to Don for all his contributions and congratulations to him on this important recognition.

Congratulations to Professor Amrita Daniere, who will begin a three year term as Chair of the UTM Department of Geography on July 1, 2006.
